Saying this reminded me of a quote from the art slideshow: "Love gives a shortcut to heaven. Since having a stroke several years ago, he has difficulty holding up his end of a phone conversation. He always thanks me for calling, but I really miss the way my brother used to be.



Later Tuesday morning I drove past a billboard that said, "Those with Alzheimer's have trouble reaching out. But you don't." Once again, I thought of my brother who nearly never phones me. The billboard made me realize how important it is for me to reach out to him, no matter how emotionally challenging it may be. It was literally a sign from the ECK!

Tuesday afternoon, while my subconscious was still processing the quote and the billboard, I read the online daily ECK "Spiritual Inspiration Quote of the Day." I was dumbfounded to see it was:

Over these two days, it was quite an awakening for me to realize that my prematurely aging brother is the "stranger" who I thought I was supposed to be looking for. *
